

EXPRESSIONS WITH CARRY

Sentences:

- a) People started to get really *carried away*. One man got on the table and started dancing.
- b) She's an important person. Her opinions *carry* a lot of *weight*.
- c) It's really quite a risky venture. I doubt whether they'll be able to *carry it off*.
- d) Her great courage *carried her through* her illness
- e) The motion was *carried* by 310 votes to 306.
- f) It was all quite funny but they really *carried* the joke *too far*.
- g) His voice didn't *carry* to the back of the hall. I couldn't hear what he was saying.
- h) Do you think she'll *carry out* her threat to resign?
- i) He *carried on* talking despite all the noise.

- i) To continue doing something.
